

# Existing Projects in High Risk Counties in Arkansas


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## Summary

The Red County Action Planning Committee, in accordance with Arkansas Act 790 of 2011, has completed an inventory of programs operated in the 17 “red counties” – those counties identified as having a life expectancy 6-10 years less than the county with the best life expectancy, Benton. Across the 14 agencies, a total of 194 distinct projects were identified, many being operated in multiple counties.

The number of programs by county is depicted in Figure 1. The greatest number of projects were reported in four counties: Desha (76); Ouachita (71); Union (62); and



Chicot (60) counties. Between 30 and 54 programs were reported in each of 9 counties: Phillips (54); St. Francis (49); Crittenden (47); Dallas (41); Jackson (41); Poinsett (41); Lee (39); Mississippi (39); Monroe (39); Woodruff (32); Fulton (30); and Polk (30) counties. The remaining counties were reported to have more than 20 but fewer than 30 programs each. The smallest number of programs reported for any county was 27 (Little River County).

**Types of programs.** Of the 194 programs, the large majority (134; 69%) were related to *health education and promotion*. Twelve (12; 6%) were related to *environmental health*, 27 (14%) to *health care or access to care*, 16 (8%) to *transportation*, and 5 (3%) to *employment*.

**Funding sources.** Funding for the projects derived from a variety of sources. The majority of the programs (101, 52%) reported funding from State funds (from general revenue, excise taxes, Master Settlement Funds). Federal sources (including grants and other funds) were used for 93 (48%) of the programs, and fees or program income helped fund 12 (6%) programs. Private sources (philanthropy, private insurance) contributed funding to 20 (10%) programs and 18 (9%) received funding from other miscellaneous sources. The estimated total dollars being spent in the red counties is \$817,386,659.



Because of variation in the reporting of funding for the individual projects, it is not possible to determine funds expended within specific counties. The reader is referred to the individual project summaries that are included with this summary report.

## **Recommendations**

This reporting effort represents the first time that state agencies have come together to identify the health promoting activities already present in our counties with the greatest health challenges. The Red County Action Planning Committee looks forward to the next steps in this effort, and anticipates that the synthesis of this information will help inform both current activities and the collaborative project being planned under the auspices of Act 798. Comprehensive recommendations will be included in future reports.

Designate/employ a CSH Coordinator;</li> <li>2. CSH Coordinator and district administrator shall attend a CSH orientation training (sites will re-attend if administration and/or Coordinator changes).</li> <li>3. Coordinated School Health Coordinator or designee shall attend quarterly coordinators' meetings and are encouraged to attend other trainings that the Office of Coordinated School Health provides related to Act 1220, Joint Use Agreement, CSH Components, etc;</li> <li>4. The district's wellness committees include but are not limited to membership from the following positions; school board member, administrator, student, community member, school nurse, parent, food service personnel, physical education/health teacher, special education supervisor and alternative education supervisor, school staff personnel and transportation supervisor;</li> <li>5. The wellness committee documents regularly scheduled meetings. No less than one week prior to these meetings, each school will submit the date, time, place and agenda to the Coordinated School Health Office. Each school will hold a minimum of two committee meetings per year, one each semester. However, additional meetings are encouraged for continued reflection and growth. After each meeting, a sign in sheet should be provided to the Coordinated School Health Office;</li> </ol>

6. Participate in the Annual Coordinated School Health Evaluation;
7. If selected, participate in Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), Youth Tobacco Survey (YTS), School Health Profiles, Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment (APNA) etc;
8. For each school year, the following materials shall be submitted to the Coordinated School Health Office will include;

November 15<sup>th</sup> each year:

- Agenda, minutes and sign-in sheets documenting all district wellness committee meetings.
- Wellness priority in ACSIP
- School Health Index
- CSH Grant Expenditures

June 15<sup>th</sup> each year:

- Agenda, minutes and sign-in sheet documenting all district wellness committee meetings.
- Work plan progress
- CSH Grant Yearly Expenditures

9. For all first year Coordinated School Health Schools, the district's wellness committee will develop a one year action plan to implement a minimum of two CSH components. Then, each year schools should demonstrate progress toward adding the other six components.

DESCRIPTION	<p>The SNAP Program provides a nutrition safety net for low-income children, families and adults. Benefits are issued electronically by a contract provider to program participants. Benefits are based on income, resources and household size. Program services are funded 100% by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Administrative expenditures are matched at a rate of 50% Federal funds to 50% State funds. The Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) pays 100% of the cost of the food benefits and 50% of all administrative costs. National benefit levels are established by FNS annually. More than \$734.6 Million in SNAP benefits were issued to Arkansans in State Fiscal Year 2012. In the Red Counties, over \$134.2 million in benefits were provided to 118,512 people during State Fiscal Year 2012.</p> <p>The Division issues SNAP benefits through a Statewide Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) System. According to USDA, every \$5 in new SNAP benefits generates \$9.00 in total community spending. Because the majority of SNAP benefits are redeemed the month they are issued, SNAP acts as an immediate economic stimulus to struggling local economies. New SNAP benefits also generate additional economic activity as families are able to increase their overall food purchasing power. The SNAP Program is an integral part of the Division’s efforts to strengthen the health and well-being of children, families and adults. The Agency is conducting additional program outreach, especially to the elderly, and is improving access to services through online applications and other web-based service applications.</p> <p>DCO caseworkers located in the DHS county offices throughout the State determine eligibility for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. This eligibility is based on household size, monthly family income and resources.</p> <p>The Division works with the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff and the University of Arkansas Cooperative Extension Service to provide Nutrition Education services to SNAP recipients. The USDA Food and Nutrition Service provides 100% Federal funds for these educational activities.</p> <p>The Division contracts directly with local Adult Education Centers and other interested entities to provide Employment and Training activities to SNAP recipients in as many counties as possible. The contracts are paid with 100% Federal funds.</p>

The Farmers Market Program has been established by USDA to allow consumers to have access to locally grown, farm fresh produce, enable farmers the opportunity to expand their customer base, and cultivate consumer loyalty with the farmers who grows the produce. In order to participate in the Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) Farmers Market Program, each market must be authorized by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) to accept SNAP benefits. The USDA provides funds for the purchase of Point of Sale devices and monthly wireless fees so fresh fruits and vegetables can be purchased by SNAP recipients with their Electronic Benefits Transfer card. The grants are paid with 100% Federal funds.

The SNAP Program serves as a safety net for low-income Arkansans by providing nutritional assistance for eligible individuals. The Department of Human Services will continue to provide nutrition services within available resources by improving access opportunities and partnering with state agencies and non-profit organizations.

Applications for several DHS services can now be filed online. Interested applicants can use an online screening tool at <https://access.arkansas.gov/Intro.aspx> to see if they qualify for several DHS services, including SNAP. Online applications for SNAP can be filed at <https://access.arkansas.gov/Welcome.aspx>.

The USDA has provided federal funds for the purchase of eight Mobile Eligibility Vans that will be used to increase the participation of the elderly and children in the SNAP Program by providing an opportunity to file online applications. Arkansas has been reported as the state with the highest level of child hunger and food insecurity. The No Kid Hungry initiative, sponsored by the Governor's Office, is partnering with state agencies, advocates and non-profits to provide additional nutritional benefits to this under-served group. The vans will be a key component in providing additional access for services other than applying at a county office. While the vans will be manned by existing employees, an outreach coordinator will be responsible for statewide scheduling of the vans, conducting and attending meetings with partners and internal staff, providing reports on progress of program goals and objectives, monitoring the program budget and evaluating program effectiveness.

A Cooperative Extension agent can be included on these trips to provide training on healthy cooking, eating, and exercise. USDA has made fitness a part of nutrition education training which can be offered as a stand-alone training module. Cooperative Extension can tailor fitness related programming for the counties in this project area.

DESCRIPTION	<p>The Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant provides federal funding to states for a wide range of benefits and activities. It is best known as the source of funding for cash assistance payments for needy families with children, with federal requirements about work and time limits for families receiving assistance. Federal law also permits other benefits and services to be provided to low-income families with children or other activities supporting program goals of reducing out-of-wedlock pregnancies and promoting two-parent families. In Arkansas, TANF funds the Transitional Employment Assistance (TEA) Program and the Work Pays Program. TANF provides financial assistance to help pay for food, shelter, utilities, and other expenses. The TANF Block Grant is provided to the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services (DWS). The Department of Human Services, Division of County Operations determines eligibility for TEA and Work Pays and DWS provides case management services which include work supports such as job training, education, transportation, child care, etc.</p> <p>The TEA Program limits benefits to 24 months in a lifetime, with rare exceptions, for adults with children. Cash assistance provided to children only, referred to as “child only cases”, ends when the child turns 18. There is a requirement that children attend school and are immunized. The adult has to sign a Personal Responsibility Agreement to receive benefits and they must perform activities that lead to employment.</p> <p>The Work Pays Program is an incentive program designed to encourage working TEA clients to remain employed after closure of the TEA case while increasing hours of work and/or the hourly wage. Work Pays recipients are also eligible to receive a time limited monthly cash assistance payment. Child care services can be provided while the client receives benefits and continue for up to 36 months after case closure due to employment. In the Red Counties, approximately 3,121 adults and 6,484 children benefited from TEA and Work Pays during State Fiscal Year 2012.</p>

Due to recent TANF funding cuts and dwindling reserves, better utilization of these available funds are needed to ensure that the appropriate focus and resources are placed upon the overall health of low-income residents. A robust safety net must be maintained to ensure that vulnerable and minority populations do not fall through the cracks. Minority and vulnerable communities are those who not able to access affordable health care coverage and/or services and thus disproportionately rely on the safety net, e.g., low-income parents, low-wage working adults with children, low-income parents with barriers to employment.</li> <li>• <b>Increased recruitment of Health Care training candidates by the State's Workforce Investment Act (WIA), Trade Adjustment Act (TAA) and other employment and training programs.</b> There exists a critical need for more health care professionals and support personnel from ethnic or racial minority groups and that such individuals are more likely to serve minority and medically underserved communities, such as the Arkansas "Red" Counties.</li> </ul>				

- ***Increased emphasis on identifying High Wage Occupations and Training by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education's Career Pathways Initiative (CPI).*** The TANF-funded Career Pathways Initiative is designed to provide increased access to post-secondary education for the state's low-income citizens. A lack of health insurance disproportionately hurts low-income families and communities of color in no small part because health insurance in the United States remains linked to employment. Higher-paying jobs tend to offer more comprehensive health benefit packages, while lower-paying jobs – jobs disproportionately occupied by people of color – tend to offer only limited health benefits, if offered at all, that are often accompanied by high cost-sharing arrangements with employees. Increased efforts to offer High Wage Occupation training will enhance the Red Counties' resident's ability to acquire and maintain higher-paying jobs and the accompanying health benefits.

DESCRIPTION	<p>An effort to help increase the capacity of service agencies to meet the needs victims of violent crime including victims with disabilities was initiated in response to a request from the Holly Grove Chief of Police, and a service provider serving the area who attended the “National Conference on Responding to Victims of Crime with Disabilities” Conference that 19 members from Arkansas attended last December (2011). Several members who attended this conference agreed to bring training to utilize their resources to bring training to this area of the state. Two trainings were held in March. The first was coordinated through Partners and was entitled: 1) “Coming Together to Address Violence and Provide Supports for Victims.” Thirty two people from the area attended. Issues addressed included: A Brief Needs Assessment Discussion to dialog about Resources present, Overview of Victim Service Programs, Understanding Adult Protective Services, Dynamics of Domestic Violence , Indicators of Child Abuse, People with Disabilities as Victims of Violence, and Providing Supports to Crime Victims including information on Trauma. This all day training gave individuals from various law enforcement agencies and community programs a chance to learn and dialog about several forms of violence that affect Monroe County and the surrounding areas. Understanding violence, its indicators and its impact can ultimately assist in improving the supports that are offered to victims of these crimes and reduce the risks that violence will occur. 2.) The second activity was held on March 29th coordinated by the Arkansas Coalition Against Sexual Assault with participation from Partners staff as a trainer. This activity was targeted to law enforcement and was entitled “Improving Sexual Investigating” with the objective of helping to improve capacity in the area for law enforcement to recognize violent crime, to interview victims and to successfully prosecute. Thirteen participants attended. Our section addressed “Violence Against Individuals with Disabilities”. Quantitative data for the overall event showed a 20% increase in knowledge. 3.) On June 21, training was sponsored by our project entitled “Collaborating and Supporting Victims (Including those with Disabilities).” Sixteen people from the community attended this training. Information regarding this law was provided to community members. It was decided at this meeting in discussion with community members that our project would expand support to this county to build a violence/victim services and disability collaborative team. More support and training will be provided over a period of at least 6 months in an effort to increase the capacity of service agencies to meet the needs of persons with disabilities who are victims of crime in this underserved area. A further needs assessment process will take place at the next event in July. While the major effort is in Monroe, the efforts have also included people from surrounding counties who were interested and came to participate, the surrounding counties of Phillips, Arkansas, Lee, and St. Francis.</p>

The curriculum was developed by the EFNEP staff at the University of California at Davis and Colorado State University. <b><i>Eating Smart • Being Active</i></b> is designed for paraprofessional nutrition educators to use when teaching low-income families with young children to learn healthy lifestyle choices. The curriculum consists of eight core lessons, each 60 to 90 minutes long, designed to be taught in order. The teaching techniques in the lesson plans of <b><i>Eating Smart • Being Active</i></b> are based on the adult learning principle, dialogue-based learning or learner-centered education outlined in Dr. Joye A. DESCRIPTION	<p>Safety Baby Showers provide information, evidence-based methods, and products to keep infants and children safe at home and in vehicles. Each shower covers the following topics, highlighting steps that parents can take to reduce the risk of unintentional injury to infants and children:</p> <p><u>Prevention of motor vehicle injury:</u> Parents are introduced to correct selection and installation of car seats. Participants receive a new child safety seat. A certified technician of the National Child Passenger Safety Program correctly installs the child safety seats. Parents assist the technician with installation of the child safety seats, to gain hands-on experience with correct techniques.</p> <p><u>Prevention of fire, burn and scald injury:</u> A bath water thermometer is provided to protect against scalding during bathing. Electrical outlet covers are provided to protect against electrical burns.</p> <p><u>Prevention of choking and suffocation:</u> Parents learn to assess the crib and home for choking and suffocation risks to infants. American Academy of Pediatrics recommendations for infant safe sleep are discussed. As funds are available, each participant receives a portable pack-and-play style crib. The cribs are certified for infant sleep by the Juvenile Products Manufacturers Association.</p> <p><u>Prevention of poisoning:</u> The risks of household cleaners as toxins to children are emphasized. Cabinet locks are provided.</p> <p><u>Prevention of the Shaken Baby Syndrome/Abusive Head Trauma:</u> The <i>Period of PURPLE Crying</i>® program is the National Center on Shaken Baby Syndrome's (SBS) evidence-based program, which includes a full color booklet and a DVD that is viewed at the shower and sent home with each participant.</p>

11          (b) The General Assembly finds:
