WHAT TO EXPECT AT **COMMUNITY-BASED TESTING SITES**

For Healthcare Facility Workers & First Responders



- You must arrive in a personal vehicle
- Items to bring:
 - Photo ID
 - Health insurance card (everyone will be tested regardless if they have insurance)
 - Healthcare facility employee or first responder ID/Badge (if applicable)

THINGS TO CONSIDER

- There are **no** bathrooms;
- Each person who needs testing must be seated next to a working window;
- All passengers must stay inside vehicles from arrival to departure;
- Try to limit the people in your vehicle to those needing testing; and
- There may be significant wait times.

ARRIVAL

Each vehicle will be greeted and directed by personnel in full medical protective gear.

TEMPERATURE CHECK

Your temperature will be checked using a no touch thermometer.

REGISTRATION

- Each person needing testing will be asked to provide the following:
 - Photo ID

- Current address (where you are staying)

First and last name

- Best phone number to reach you (indicate
- Healthcare facility employee or first mobile/landline) responder ID/badge
 - Insurance card (if available)

TESTING

- A healthcare provider in personal protective equipment will provide you with instructions.
- You will be given a tissue to blow your nose and will need to keep your tissue to dispose on your own.
- A soft swab will be inserted deep into your nose to get the necessary sample. This may be slightly uncomfortable; however, the test is quick and should take less than a minute.

INFORMATION & DEPARTURE

- Once the test is complete, you will move to the final station.
- You will be given information to take with you on what to do while awaiting test results. Please keep this paper until you get your test results.
- Depart/Exit Community-based Testing Site.
- Follow the instructions on the paper provided by the Community-based Testing Site. Continue to monitor and record symptoms. You will receive test results via telephone.

For medical emergencies, call 911 and notify the dispatch that you may have COVID-19.
