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

Shout Out to Creative Nurses

The Arkansas State Board of Nursing's (ASBN) new alternative to discipline (ATD) program officially begins in early fall. ASBN began work on developing an ATD program in 1991 and has attempted multiple times since without success. In the 2017 General Assembly, Sen. Files and Reps. Boyd and Pilkington sponsored a bill to create Arkansas' first ATD program for nurses. The bill passed and the Arkansas Nurses Alternative Program (ArNAP) was created. Most other states have an ATD program for nurses, and in Arkansas, physicians, pharmacists and attorneys have an ATD program.

The American Nurses Association (ANA) estimates that six to eight percent of nurses use alcohol or drugs to an extent that is sufficient to impair professional performance. The majority of nurses disciplined by ASBN are related to issues associated with drugs and alcohol. The creation of an ATD program allows the Board to respond to drug and alcohol related issues that may impact public safety in a non-disciplinary manner.

The basic requirements for participation in ArNAP are similar to those of a discipline order, such as drug testing, workplace monitoring, group counseling and self-reports. The benefit for the nurse participating in ArNAP is, upon successful completion of the program, there is not a permanent discipline flag on their nursing license.

A lot of work goes into creating a new program, and I need your help with part of this work. ArNAP needs a logo, and I am reaching out to creative nurses in Arkansas for assistance. We need a logo for our new program, so we are having a Logo Design Contest.

The rules for the logo design are:

- Must incorporate the name of the program, ArNAP
- May include line art and text but no photograph
- May use a maximum of three colors
- Must be your own original unpublished work and must not include any third-party logos or copyrighted material



Only Arkansas licensed nurses or nursing students currently enrolled in an Arkansas nursing program are eligible to submit a logo design. All designs must be submitted by August 31, 2018. The complete list of rules and the Design Agreement are located on the ASBN website, www.arsbn.org.

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


Congressional Bills Currently Affecting Nursing

There are a number of bills currently in the 115th Congressional Legislative Session that could have significant effects on the practice of nursing, and it is important for nurses to be knowledgeable to speak about current nursing issues. Take the time to become informed and reach out to Arkansas legislators for their support. They want to hear from their constituents with a vested interest in these bills, particularly nurses and patients affected by these health care issues.

House Bill H.R. 5052-Safe Staffing for Nurse and Patient Safety Act of 2018, was introduced in the House by Rep. David P. Joyce (R-OH) on February 15, 2018, and subsequently referred to the Subcommittee on Health. This bill will overhaul hospital staffing and work to support staffing solutions that are safe and put patients and nurses first. As a nurse, you understand how inadequate staffing can lead to injury, fatigue, nurse burn-out and most importantly, life-threatening patient care situations. Being a nurse on the front-line, it is important your voice is heard. This is your opportunity to influence the safety and quality of your profession while advocating for your patients.

House Bill H.R. 1617-Promoting Access to Diabetic Shoes Act, sponsored by Rep. Tom Reed (R-NY) was introduced on March 17, 2017, and is currently in the House Subcommittee on Health. This bill amends title XVIII (Medicare) for the Social Security Act to allow nurse practitioners and physician assistants to complete the documentation requirements for Medicare coverage of special shoes for individuals with diabetes. Current law only allows this to be completed by a physician. As we know, advanced practice registered nurses care for individuals with diabetes on a daily basis in family practice, as well as in the hospital setting. This bill would reduce Medicare spending by reducing



duplicated services and improve the quality and timeliness of care.

House Bill H.R. 3692-Addiction Treatment Access Improvement Act of 2017, was introduced in the House on September 7, 2017, by Rep. Paul Tonko (D-NY-20). The most recent action by the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health was on April 25, 2018.

"This bill amends the Controlled Substances Act to revise the qualifications required for a practitioner to administer, dispense, or prescribe narcotic drugs for maintenance or detoxification treatment in an office-based opioid treatment program. It increases the maximum patient limit for a qualifying practitioner who meets certain requirements. The maximum patient limit is the maximum number of patients a qualifying

practitioner can treat at one time. The bill expands qualifying practitioners to include additional nonphysician practitioners: clinical nurse specialists, certified registered nurse anesthetists, and certified nurse midwives. It makes permanent the authorization for certain nonphysician practitioners to become qualifying practitioners." (https://www.congress.gov/bill/ 115th-congress/house-bill/3692).

This legislative bill expands the previous Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act to allow clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse midwives and certified registered nurse anesthetists to prescribe buprenorphine in the fight against the opioid crisis in America. These individuals, like nurse practitioners, would prescribe in accordance with state law.

As of May 7, 2018, we do not have Arkansas co-sponsors for any of the bills listed above.

Senate Bill S. 445, the **Home Health Care Planning** Improvement Act of 2017,

sponsored by Sen. Susan M. Collins (R-ME), was introduced on February 27, 2017, and is currently in the Committee on Finance. This bill would allow Medicare payment for home health services ordered by a nurse practitioner, a clinical nurse specialist, a certified nurse-midwife, or a physician assistant. This would make it possible for NPs, CNSs, CNMs, and PAs to certify that patients under their care are eligible for home health care services, reducing Medicare spending and improving the quality and timeliness of care for their patients. We would like to thank Arkansas' Sen. John Boozman and Rep. Rick Crawford for co-sponsoring this bill.


President Ramonda Housh presided over the business meeting held on May 10 and the hearings on June 6-7. Highlights of Board actions are as follows:

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Nurses' Role in Patient-Centered Medical Homes



Practices that have adopted a patient-centered medical home (PCMH) model focus on the patient's health goals and needs through a physician-led team approach. Throughout Arkansas, nurses are a vital part of care teams that are working to coordinate patient-centered care across the health care continuum to improve patients' experience and health outcomes. Ideally, this will lead to lower costs over time and an increased investment in primary care.

Like other states, Arkansas was facing unsustainable growth in health costs. Arkansas included the PCMH program as a key part of the state's Health Care Payment Improvement Initiative. By rewarding practices that embrace PCMH to transform their practice through team-based care, early intervention, plus care for chronic conditions, their costs can be reduced.

The state has received positive national attention because of Arkansas Medicaid's efforts to implement both payment reform and practice improvement.

Arkansas nurses can be the catalyst for transforming to a PCMH model as health care continues the shift to proactive, value-based care. Nurses are at the forefront of care and must have a clear understanding of all aspects that are driving change. Nurses' role in PCMH requires more than clinical skills. They must have a broader skillset that includes the ability to utilize data analytics, (from internal electronic health records (EHR) and other payer data) to drive patient-centered care. Implementation of PCMH requires a partnership among the practice, the patient, the patient's family and the patient's health care team.

While many Arkansas practices are engaged in a PCMH model of care, the transition to a team-based, patient-focused approach to care is ongoing. It provides the opportunity for nurses to lead health care teams as they strive to improve patient outcomes through proactive care.

Arkansas Foundation for Medical Care's (AFMC) PCMH practice transformation supports nurses and providers across the state involved in Arkansas' Health Care Payment Improvement Initiative as they transform their practice to meet program activities tracked for practice support, meet the quality metrics and work to reduce practice costs.

Arkansas Medicaid contracted with AFMC PCMH-PT in 2015 to support practices' transformation to a PCMH. AFMC has a unique combination of knowledge about Medicaid policy and regulations, experience providing hands-on support to practices, and the use of unique tools we've developed for health care professionals and patients. AFMC's multidisciplinary, practice transformation team has been key to this success. Many team members have

direct clinical experience and understand what it takes to adopt new processes and transform the practice's culture. AFMC works as an advocate for all types of practices throughout the state, in both urban and rural areas, as well as providing direct support to ensure their success.

AFMC continues to offer PCMHs the option of several levels of support to meet their practice's needs to achieve program goals. Practice transformation support services include on-site and/or virtual visits, phone support, assessment and monitoring, population health management, EHR optimization, alignment of multi-initiative efforts, and regional and statewide learning opportunities. Practices can choose the level of service that meets their needs; cost of services is based on the number of PCMHattributed beneficiaries.

The most requested educational topics are developing care plans, clinical quality measures and how to use EHR data to transform a practice. AFMC's specialized staff helps practices identify the missed opportunities, close gaps, and improve workflow and processes. Participation in PCMH is voluntary and practices may enroll in late summer or early fall, 2018, through the AHIN portal.

Transforming a practice to the PCMH model is a journey that cannot be successful without the support and experience of the practice's nurses. The fundamental changes required by a practice's organizational culture is an ongoing, transformative process that supports improved patient outcomes and alternative payment models, driving the movement to value-based health care.



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The Arkansas State Board of Nursing is a state agency. For this reason, there are many laws and regulations with which we must comply regarding the finances of the ASBN. The financial cycle consists of several parts:

1. THE STRATEGIC PLAN

This is the first step in the financial cycle. Board members determine the direction of the ASBN. Since the state operates on a biennial budget, the board members must be forward thinking since they must determine what needs to be accomplished in the next two years.

2. BUDGETING

This step requires looking at the priorities set by the board members and determining how much money it will take to make it happen. This is similar to what we might do at home when we are trying to decide if we have enough to eat at the steakhouse in town this week, or should we stick to the burger place down the street. However, this is where the budgeting similarities end. Once we decide what we "can" do at home, we do it, but in state government there are additional steps. The budget of the ASBN must be submitted to the state Office of Budget. It must then be approved by the governor's office and the legislature and ultimately becomes an act before any money can be spent. The budget of the state as a whole is considered at this level, so everything requested is not necessarily granted.

3. IMPLEMENTATION

The next part of the cycle is to implement the Board's directives while staying within the budget. Again, like at home there are always going to be unexpected things. This is especially true since we are on a two year cycle. However, unlike at home, we cannot "splurge" every once in a while. Staying within the budget is the law.

4. REPORTING

The financial status of the ASBN is monitored on a daily basis, and monthly reports are reviewed by the



Board. The fiscal year for the ASBN ends on June 30. At this point, the books are examined for year-end reporting, closed and compiled into annual financials. Financial information is included in the annual report of the ASBN. It is also combined with other governmental entities in the state to prepare the statewide financials.

5. AUDITING

The financials of the ASBN are audited on a regular basis by Legislative Audit to ensure the accuracy of the information presented.

The financial goal of the ASBN is to use the funds available to the agency in the most effective and efficient manner possible and to report the financial status accurately. This process allows the board to have the funds necessary to issue licenses, discipline when necessary and implement other related programs, such as continuing education and nursing student loans. The process described above is the simplified version of our financial cycle, but hopefully it is enough to give you an idea of how the process works. The regulations we follow help ensure that funds are available to fulfill the Board's mission of protecting the public.

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NURSING COMPLAINTS ASBN and OLTC Roles



I regularly receive calls from Arkansas nurses who have an active complaint with the Arkansas State Board of Nursing (ASBN) and the Arkansas Office of Long Term Care (OLTC). The nurse receives a letter from the OLTC that indicates an investigation against them has been unfounded and expects ASBN to stop their investigation. I hope to shine some light on this for those who practice in Long Term Care.

In short, ASBN and OLTC are looking at two separate issues. ASBN receives complaints filed with the OLTC regarding licensed nurses, and investigates complaints which, if substantiated, are violations of the *Arkansas Nurse Practice Act*. The OLTC investigates complaints against facilities, as well as allegations of abuse or neglect of residents, theft of residents' property and poor quality of resident care. An OLTC complaint results in "Founded" or "Unfounded." Founded reports issued by the OLTC are based on these reportable elements:

- 1. Any alleged, suspected or witnessed occurrences of abuse or neglect to residents.
- Any alleged, suspected or witnessed occurrence of misappropriation of resident property or exploitation of a resident.
- 3. Any alleged, suspected or witnessed occurrences of verbal abuse. For purposes of this regulation, "verbal abuse" means the use of oral, written, or gestured language that willfully includes disparaging and derogatory terms to residents, or within their hearing distance, regardless of their age, ability to comprehend, or disability. Examples of verbal abuse include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Threats of harm
 - Saying things to frighten a resident, such as telling a resident that they will never be able to see their family again
- 4. Any alleged, suspected or witnessed occurrences of sexual abuse to residents by any individual.

OLTC removes the ability of the nurse to continue to work in a Long Term Care Facility. Additionally, if a

"Founded" report is issued, the nurse is usually added to the Adult Maltreatment Central Registry.

The mission of the ASBN is to protect the public and act as their advocate by effectively regulating the practice of nursing. As it pertains to discipline, ASBN investigates to determine if a nurse violated the *Arkansas Nurse Practice Act*, as well as the accompanying *Rules*.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE REPORTING ACT

For all health care administrators and directors of nursing, you should also be aware of Arkansas Statute § 17-80-117: The Substance Abuse Reporting Act. The Substance Abuse Reporting Act was passed in the 2015 Regular Session of the 90th General Assembly and states, "...(4)(b) The chief executive officer or an official agent of a required reporter, or his or her designee, shall report to the appropriate licensing authority the following:

- A final disciplinary action taken against a health care professional as a result of the diversion, misuse, or abuse of illicit drugs or controlled substances as defined by state and federal law by a health care professional; and
- 2. The voluntary resignation of any health care professional against whom a disciplinary action arising from the diversion, misuse, or abuse of illicit drugs or controlled substances as defined by state and federal law by a health care professional if a disciplinary action is pending..."

There is much more to this statute, and I encourage those involved in health care administration to review it.

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
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National Certification, ASBN Chapter 4 *Rules*, Enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact



NATIONAL CERTIFICATION

National certification is linked to your advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) license in that you may not hold an APRN license in Arkansas without current certification. If your certification expires, your APRN license becomes inactive until a current copy of certification is presented to the Board office.

The acute care nurse practitioner and the gerontology nurse practitioner certifications have been retired. If these certifications expire, you will have to take the Adult Gerontology exam.

Please keep your certification up-to-date and a current copy on file at the ASBN. Your license and collaborative practice agreement are contingent upon holding a current national certification certificate.

ASBN *RULES,* CHAPTER 4 — ADVANCED PRACTICE REGISTERED NURSE

Arkansas State Board of Nursing (ASBN) *Rules*, Chapter 4 is dedicated to the APRN. ASBN *Rules* are updated after each legislative session and periodically as needed. The Chapter 4 *Rules* that were updated January 1, 2018,

reflect the laws that came from the 2017 legislative session.

ASBN *Rules* are found at www.arsbn.org under the Laws and Rules tab. APRNs should refer to these often, as you are held to them both legally and professionally. The *Rules* include sections on the APRN Scope of Practice, Qualifications for Licensure, Licensure, Duplicate License, Name or Address Change, Standards of Nursing Practice, Professional Certification Programs, Prescriptive Authority, Prescribing Guidelines for Anorexiant Drugs, Prescriptive Authority Advisory Committee, Nursing Education Programs, Prescribing for Chronic Nonmalignant Pain, Minimum Standards for Establishing a Patient Relationship and Telemedicine. You must keep your practice up-to-date.

ENHANCED NURSE LICENSURE COMPACT

The current Enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact (eNLC) is <u>ONLY</u> active for the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse. There has been confusion regarding the compact and your APRN license. You cannot travel to a compact state and practice with your Arkansas APRN license. The APRN licenses are single state only and must be issued by the state in which the practice takes place.



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This activity has been submitted to the Midwest Multistate Division for approval to award nursing contact hours. The Midwest Multistate Division is accredited as an approver of continuing nursing education by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation.



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WHAT EDUCATORS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE ENHANCED NURSE LICENSURE COMPACT

A Brief History of the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC)

Removing barriers to cross-border practice, the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) is an interstate agreement allowing a nurse to have one license and the privilege to practice in other compact states. Implemented in 2000, the NLC fosters public protection and access to care through the mutual recognition of one state-based license that is enforced locally and recognized nationally. Along with a majority of state nurses associations, hospital associations and health care facilities in every state overwhelmingly support the NLC. The NLC includes important patient safety features such as facilitation of the sharing of licensure, investigative and disciplinary action information among member states.

Since the NLC's initial launch, advances in technology and an increasingly mobile nursing workforce and patient population have created the need to break down barriers to interstate practice. Access to care has expanded. Telehealth has transformed care delivery and erased geographic boundaries. In recent years, hundreds of bills with the goal of enabling telehealth in more than 44 states were introduced. The NLC has the ability to remove the licensure barrier to telehealth practice for more than 4 million nurses. While this change has transpired, other health professions have developed interstate licensure agreements and Congress began discussing the possibility of national licensure.

In 2013, NCSBN's members began to discuss what the optimal licensure model would look like and eventually agreed that revising the current NLC (implemented in 25 states between 2000 and 2016) and the current APRN Compact (which was developed in 2001 but never implemented) would be in the best interests of all. In March of 2015 revisions to the two compacts were completed and in May 2015 a special assembly of delegates representing all BONs (two from each state) approved the new compacts. An ambitious initiative was kicked off to commit staff and financial resources to advocate for state adoption of the newly enhanced NLC (eNLC) and the APRN Compact.

MOVING FORWARD—THE ENHANCED NURSE LICENSURE COMPACT (ENLC)

Like the NLC, the eNLC increases access to health care, protects patient safety, reduces costs and supports state-of-the-art health care delivery. It also enhances nurses' mobility across states and allows nurses to quickly cross state borders when there is a disaster. The eNLC is also cost-effective, since an organization may share the expenditure of multiple licenses nurses can incur by crossing state lines. It also removes multiple and duplicate regulatory requirements, cutting down costs for nurses.

New provisions to the eNLC (as compared to the original NLC) include uniform license requirements (all states have the same licensure requirements) and state authority to obtain and submit criminal background checks.

In order to receive a multistate license in the eNLC, a nurse must meet the home state's qualifications, graduate from a board of nursing-approved nursing education program, pass the NCLEX-RN® or NCLEX-PN® Exam, have no active discipline on their license, submit to a criminal background check, have no prior state or federal felony convictions and have a valid Social Security number. The eNLC also contains a grandfathering provision: a nurse already holding a home multistate license on their compact's effective date can retain and renew that license. A nurse who changes their primary state of residence after the NLC's effective date must meet the new eNLC requirements to obtain a multistate license from their new home state.

To join, individual states must first enact eNLC model legislation. NCSBN staff are working with state legislatures to help accomplish this by testifying at committee hearings, participating in telephone and in-person meetings with legislators in target states, and drafting language to help bills move forward.

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Disciplinary Actions APRIL 2018

The full statutory citations for disciplinary actions can be found at www.arsbn.org under Nurse Practice Act, Sub Chapter 3, \$17-87-309. Frequent violations are A.C.A. \$17-87-309 (a)(1) "Is guilty of fraud or deceit in procuring or attempting to procure a license to practice nursing or engaged in the practice of nursing without a valid license;" (a)(2) "Is guilty of a crime or gross immorality;" (a)(4) "Is habitually intemperate or is addicted to the use of habit-forming drugs;" (a)(6) "Is guilty of unprofessional conduct;" and (a)(9) "Has willfully or repeatedly violated any of the provisions of this chapter." Other orders by

the Board include civil penalties (CP), specific education courses (ED), and research papers (RP). Probation periods vary and may include an employee monitored nurse contract and/or drug monitoring and treatment programs.

Each individual nurse is responsible for reporting any actual or suspected violations of the *Nurse Practice Act*.
